Rural Broadband Remote Access Grant

Rural broadband access is essential to attracting, supporting and maintaining quality job

creators throughout the state of Nebraska. But apart from being an indispensable business

commodity for the 21 st century, high speed internet enables important opportunities such as

remote work, telehealth and education, entertainment, telecommunications and other quality of

life amenities that create thriving communities. The Broadband Grant allocates \$40 million to

provide broadband to unserved and underserved communities in Nebraska, supporting the

mission to increase the state's overall connectivity.

Who is eligible?

Communities with 1,000 to 5,000 people are eligible to apply, with the stipulations below.

See application guidelines for a complete list of eligible communities.

- The fiber-to-the-home (FTTH) project should occur in communities of 1,000 to
 5,000 residents.
- Only communities with a forecasted growth in FTTH of less than five percent by the end of 2020, as estimated by DED, will be eligible.
- Communities with a population below 1,000 may be considered if additional funds remain
- Communities should identify preferred FTTH providers that must:
 - o Currently serve in rural Nebraska communities.
 - o Have positive public support.
 - o Have a proven track record of starting and completing projects within the allocated timeline while remaining on or under budget.
 - o Have a clean financial record.

How can the grant be used:

The grant must be used to provide FTTH to households and businesses in eligible communities

where the provider did not have a project currently underway or planned.

How to apply:

If an applicant meets eligibility requirements, the applicant should submit an electronic pre-

application to DED by the deadline stipulated below. The pre-application will be used to verify

community and fiber provider eligibility. If the applicant is validated, they will receive an

invitation to complete the full application, which must be submitted by the deadline below.



Nebraska Remote Access Broadband Grant Checklist

Rules

Program is available through the CARES Act Fund and distributed through the Nebraska Department of Economic Development (DED).

Eligibility

Communities must have an approved pre-application with a broadband provider before proceeding with full application.

Unserved and underserved households and businesses in a Nebraska community with a population between 1,000 – 5,000, based on the 2018 estimated US Census Bureau data.

- Underserved is considered households and businesses with less than fifty (50) megabits per second download and fifty (50) megabits per second upload
- Unserved is considered households and businesses with less than twentyfive (25) megabits per second download and three (3) megabits per second upload or no connectivity
- c. Communities may only submit one application, providers may be connected to more than one community/project
- d. Communities with population less than 1,000 population may be considered if funds remain
- e. Providers and/or communities and/or private entity must provide at minimum one percent of total cost of the project
- f. Grant funds shall be used for broadband infrastructure, deployment and upgrades ONLY
- g. Grants funds shall **NOT** be used for on-going operation or maintenance costs
- Requested funding must be used for NEW projects only and not a project already in progress. A "progress in progress" means one in which construction of infrastructure has already started

Notifications

Once pre-application is received and approved, a link to the full application will be sent to applicant.

Full applications are expected to be available on 22 June 2020, application deadline is TBD (monitor webpage for program updates).

Applications will be accepted and considered until funds are exhausted
